Important changes to Emergency Admission Policies

In an effort to improve our clinical services, biosecurity and build stronger ties with our referring veterinarians we are adopting new referral policies.

Effective December 1, 2015

All emergency admissions must be referred by a veterinarian who has evaluated the horse for its current condition.

Right Mandibular Fracture in an Adult Horse

This is an example of a recent case where prompt identification and referral of a horse with a complex mandibular fracture, combined with the use of state of the art diagnostics and skilled surgical technique, lead to successful return to normal function.

A 9-year-old thoroughbred gelding was referred to Dr Steven Zedler at the UQ VETS Equine Specialist Hospital. The horse presented to the hospital with a large open wound over a displaced, comminuted fracture of the right angle of the mandible and an oblique non displaced

fracture associated with the right interdental space. This horse had sustained this injury during a paddock accident which had occurred within the previous 12-24 hours. Read the full case study

University of Pennsylvania's New Bolton Centre. While there he completed a fellowship in comparative orthopaedic


Equine Centre in Sydney for four years. After a short period in Adelaide, Ben grabbed the opportunity to come home to UQ and South East Queensland.

Dr Ben Ahern graduated from the School of Veterinary Science at UQ and then travelled abroad for his surgical training to the


