# Staff travels

On the 28th of November, Lead Nurse Gary FItzgerald and Exotics Nurse Rebecca de Gier from the UQ SVS Small Animal Hospital travelled to Auckland, New Zealand, to present at the annual Association of Avian Veterinarians Australasian Committee Conference. The topics presented were Avian Anaesthesia and Analgesia, Avian clinical techniques, Avian emergency care and Avian Paediatrics. There was a total of 17 technicians and nurses from Australia and New Zealand that attended the day which has received great reviews and comments.



A/Prof Rachel Allavena travelled to Vancouver Canada recently to attend the annual meeting of the American College of Veterinary Pathologists. Rachel presented a poster featuring the work of recent graduates from the BVSc program: Megan du Toit, Taylor Argent and Emily Sheehan.

Megan led the project after receiving the Summer Student Research Scholarship after completing 3<sup>rd</sup> year, whilst Taylor and Emily participated as research volunteers during that time.

The work on minimising freezing artefacts in histological sections was very well received and generated a lot of interest from many diagnostic pathologists who have to deal with deliberately or accidently frozen tissues. Some amusing anecdotes about biopsy samples freezing on Greyhound buses in Canada were shared.

Megan has prepared a manuscript, which the group are hoping to publish shortly, as a 'how to guide' to reduce the damaging effect of freezing on tissue sections. The poster had an amazing view over to

Vancouver Island which may have promoted more interest, but most likely it was the fascinating research topic.



### Eddie the pug

Eddie was a 15 month old male pug that presented to the UQVets emergency service one evening in June for progressive difficulty breathing. His owners had noticed him being unwell (changed breathing patterns, not eating, less active and shaking on his hindlegs) for a couple of days but that his signs were slowly getting worse. He had been refusing to layd own and had started coughing and retching. Eddie had been taken to his regular vet who had taken radiographs of his chest and referred him for suspected pleural effusion (fluid around his lungs). Based on his breed, sex and age, his clinical signs and the radiographs from the referring vet, a cranial lung lobe torsion was suspected. Eddie was admitted to the UQVets intensive care unit for supportive care overnight. A contrast CT scan was performed the



following morning that allowed other diseases to be ruled out and confirmed that Eddie did have a torsion (twist) of one part of a lung lobe on the left side of his chest.

Eddie was anaesthetised and taken to surgery that morning. Eddie made an uneventful recovery post surgery and was managed in intensive care at UQVets for another 2 days before being discharged home to his owners.

Eddie is now more than 4 months post surgery. His owners report he is doing 'great' and is a normal active happy pug who likes to 'dress up' on special occasions.
