
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

# School of Veterinary Science at Reconciliation Camp

On 5 December 2018, UQ launched its first Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP). The RAP outlines UQ's commitment to practical actions and deliverables that strengthen and build relationships, respect, and opportunities between Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander and non-Indigenous peoples.





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### SVS Starts Puppy Pre-school

Puppy pre-school started at the Small Animal Hospital on Tuesday 15 January following an extensive co-operative effort by several staff across the Vet School. The classes have a strong focus on behavioural development and positive-reinforcement training, and help prepare owners for the ongoing challenges of puppyhood and adolescence.

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### Head of School Visits Vietnam

In December, Nigel Perkins visited Nong Lam University to attend the 2nd International Conference on Sustainable Agriculture and Environment. The conference was cohosted by NLU, Okyama University (Japan) and The University of Queensland. Nigel delivered a keynote presentation on Sustainable Agriculture and One Health.

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### **CAWE** Research in China

The Centre for Animal Welfare and Ethics continues to grow its international livestock welfare collaborative project, with the third and largest stage about to commence with support from the Good Ventures Foundation, USA.

Phase 3 will work to establish an internationally collaborative, but locally owned, animal welfare centre in China, the single country responsible for 39% of farmed animals worldwide.

### Inner Mongolia Delegation Visit

On 11 and 12 December, the Centre for Animal Welfare and Ethics hosted a delegation from the Inner Mongolia Academy of Agricultural & Animal Husbandry Sciences. In a packed two-day program, attendees were given tours of the Gatton Campus' Animal Science Precinct and Dairy. They also received lectures from David McNeil on ruminant nutrition research and Nin King from DAF who focused on animal welfare and biosecurity. Professor Clive Phillips also lectured on both cattle welfare and sheep and goat welfare.

With the current expansion of the Animal Welfare Standards project into the Inner Mongolia region, this visit was an excellent opportunity to further develop the centre's relationships with the visiting delegates. #### **Further Details:**

Mental health first aid is the help provided to a person who is developing a mental health problem, or who is in a mental health crisis (e.g., the person is suicidal or has had a traumatic experience). Like physical first aid, mental health first aid is given until the person receives professional help or until the crisis resolves. Mental health first aid strategies are taught in evidence-based training courses authored by Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) Australia and delivered by accredited MHFA Instructors. Participants will learn the signs and symptoms of common mental health problems, where and how to get help and what sort of help has been shown by research to be effective.

This course will enable participants to:

- 1. Provide mental health first aid to a person who is developing a mental health problem, or who is in a mental health crisis, until appropriate professional treatment is received or the crisis resolves.
- 2. Develop knowledge on common mental health conditions, including signs and symptoms and appropriate interventions, including evidence-based treatment options.
