CEAL collects data on humpback whales, and some fantastic images

The Cetacean Ecology and Acoustics Laboratory (CEAL) has just wrapped up its fourth field season in the Great Barrier Reef as part of a long-standing collaboration with Blue Planet Marine. Two CEAL students, Dana Cusano and Lara Pogson-Manning, spent four weeks collecting data on humpback whale behaviour and acoustics for their PhD projects. During their last week in the field, they were joined by supervisors Associate Professor Michael Noad and Dr.

Rebecca Dunlop for a week of excellent weather and a plethora of whales, enabling them to capture extraordinary drone footage like that pictured here, as well as crucial data on the humpback whales that occupy the reef for the winter months.

The remaining two received intensive support but by the fifth day post-partum, only Vincent survived.

medetomidine on the tissue oxygen saturation measured with near infrared spectroscopy in anaesthetised dogs."

Congratulations to Arvind Sharma

Arvind Sharma, PhD student in the Centre for Animal Welfare and Ethics, was awarded third prize in the international MDPI writing competition for his essay entitled, "Judging and rewarding research and researchers: Beyond bibliometrics." The competition is open to non-native English speakers who are Ph.D. students or postdoctoral fellows at a research institute.

Commemorating UQ alumnus Professor Michael Rickard

Michael Rickard had a distinguished career in veterinary science beginning as an undergraduate of the University of Queensland. He graduated in 1963 with first class honours and a University Medal for outstanding academic excellence. He then

undertook a PhD in the Department of Parasitology, graduating in 1967.

Mike went on to hold academic positions at Massey University and then at the University of Melbourne where he led an internationally acknowledged academic research group that unraveled the early difficulties of immunology of tapeworms in animals and people. His work led to the development of the first genetically engineered vaccine against a parasite (*Taenia ovis*), which was celebrated as one of the "Milestones in Parasitology" in 1993. In 1989, while retaining a position with the University of Melbourne as Professorial Research Fellow, Mike took up the post of Chief of the CSIRO Division of Animal health.

Mike was awarded the Gilruth Prize by the Australian Veterinary Association in 2014 for outstanding service to veterinary science in Australia, and in 1991 he was the recipient of the Clunies Ross Award for Science and Technology. He was elected a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Technology and Engineering in 1992.

Following his retirement from CSIRO in 2005, Mike continued to be an active member for the federal Animal Welfare and Ethics Committee. Mike died unexpectedly in June this year.

Teacher showcase

Assoc Prof Rowland Cobbold BVSc (Hons 1), PhD, GCHEd, MASM

Rowland is best known for his role as the vet public health/ abattoir guy. Rowland



teaches into all SVS programmes (BVSc, BVetTech, BSc) and some post-grad courses in the School of Public Health. What makes Rowland a great teacher? It's his ability to engage students in veterinary public health when it is very low on their list of discipline areas of interest. Rowland has also implemented 'Dialogue Education' approaches to his small group teaching, which is complemented by innovative curriculum design to facilitate engagement and learning.

Rowland has recently stepped down after serving for many years as the School's Teaching & Learning Chair. However,

he has now been appointed to VSAAC (The Veterinary School's Accreditation Advisory Committee in Australia). Rowland participated in an OIE project to set global curricular guidelines for veterinary paraprofessional training. He has been engaged in numerous consultancies and projects related to Australian and SE Asian veterinary curriculum and standards development.
