2020 Clinical Coats Ceremony

The 2020 Clinical Coats Ceremony was held on Friday 20th November. The fourth year BVSc students mingled with SVS staff for canapes, followed by a sit down dinner in the Dining Hall. Despite not having parents or external guests due to COVID-19 restrictions, the event was a huge success and well received by the students who enjoyed the event and the opportunity to celebrate this important milestone.

Research update from the CEAL lab

This year the whales were booming! From May to November humpback whales pass



the Brisbane coast as they migrate between summer feeding in rich Antarctic waters and winter breeding grounds in northeast Australia. This population has shown some of the strongest recovery rates known after the near extinction of baleen whales in the mid-20th century.

Our research is focused on understanding what makes for a healthy whale population. To accomplish this, we are examining the relationship between hormones related to reproductive health, and energy stores obtained from

measurements of blubber from drone images. These indices will serve as a baseline of what we can expect to see in a healthy population of whales. With this information, we can better understand why other populations may not be similarly thriving and rapidly recognize future threats to the health of this population.

Collecting data can be a challenge, and we are grateful for all of the help and support provided by students, volunteers, and the QYAC rangers. While out in the field we also are lucky to witness some of the spectacular behaviour that humpback whales are famous for. Whales are often seen breaching and slapping their powerful flippers or flukes on the surface of the water. Sometimes, large competitive groups of whales put on such displays as a mother shields her calf from the rambunctious behaviour. We hope that our research contributes to keeping this population health so people can enjoy these experiences for years to come.

Chiara Palmieri and Ricardo Soares Magalhaes speak at GIVCS annual meeting

Chiara Palmieri and Ricardo Soares Magalhaes have been recently invited to speak at the annual meeting of the Global Initiative of Veterinary Cancer Surveillance, an online event organised by the University of Porto (Portugal) on 7-8 October 2020.

GIVCS is an international group created in 2018 to foster the exchange of information between cancer registries internationally in order to provide meaningful data on the occurrence and outcome of cancer for comparative and epidemiological studies, research into the cause of cancer and adoption of control strategies.

Chiara presented the outcomes of the GIVCS work on veterinary cancer coding, as well as the status of cancer registration in companion animals in Australia. Ricardo spoke about the importance of veterinary epidemiology and spatial modelling in the analysis of cancer data. The abstracts of this meeting are available at the GIVCS website.

Malcolm Jones and Chiara Palmieri were both invited speakers at the International Conference on Animal Science and Veterinary Medicine for Students (ICAVETS) 2020 organised by the Faculty of Veterinary Medicine of the Universitas Brawijaya on the 15th of October 2020.

Malcolm spoke about the One Health response to the COVID-19 Pandemic, while Chiara talked about environmental cancer prevention in companion animals and humans – animal sentinels of human cancer. The online Zoom session was a great success with almost 200 people joining the talks!

UQ SVS registered as ECVP training centre

UQ SVS is one of the 50 ECVP (European College of Veterinary Pathologists) registered training centres (the only one in Australia!) under the supervision of Chiara Palmieri (ECVP Diplomate) and Rachel Allavena (ACVP Diplomate). Being a qualified training program, UQ SVS can provide broadly-based theoretical and practical experience in veterinary pathology, meeting the training requirements of the ECVP Council for candidates to take the ECVP certifying examination.

As part of the online training organised by the ECVP, on the 27th of October Chiara has delivered a 2 hours webinar on "How to read and describe ultrastructural pictures", providing a comprehensive overview on the interpretation of electron microscopy pictures of normal tissues and pathological lesions. SVS researchers feature on ABC Southern Queensland's Mornings program

On Tuesday 20 October, ABC Southern Queensland's Mornings program host Belinda Sanders visited UQ Gatton, collecting stories from the School of Veterinary Science.

Swaid Abdullah discussed his work estimating the prevalence and distribution of parasites in pet dogs (a risk not only for our dogs, but also to humans particularly children) and also studying dog owners' attitude towards such infections. He talked about how this will eventually aid in developing future prevention and control strategies for parasites in dogs and the potential transmission of infection in shared spaces.

Nick Clark also discussed his current work, building an ensemble forecasting model that can anticipate the timing and severity of tick paralysis season. The stories broadcast throughout October and early November, with Belinda hoping to come back for more stories in early 2021.

Norbert Gaulton – Tutor, Veterinary Surgery and Medicine

What does Norbert teach?

Norbert is best known for his surgical teaching for the BVSc students. This begins in VETS1018 with the suture practicals and continues through the years with both formal tutoring within the surgical and anaesthetic practicals but also informal surgical tutoring



within the HUB and contribution to extra-curricular activities for student special interest groups including the Small Animal Medicine and Surgery SIG. He also helps to supervise the final year students on the Cherbourg Clinical Elective. In addition to his surgical roles, Norbert teaches content related to the financial management of veterinary practices as part of VETS3024, the third year business subject. With the experience of running his own veterinary practice for years, Norbert can bring some great real-world experiences and tips to his teaching.

In 2017, Norbert ran weekly workshops for students of any year level. This resulted in a broad array of students advancing their suturing skills and preparing them for both the program and overseas surgical extramural activities. Student feedback highlighted Norbert's breadth and generosity of knowledge, his patience, ability to breakdown the skills and the depth of his clinical experience making the associated conversation as important as the skills taught.

Despite being one of the most experienced teaching staff in the School, Norbert is constantly seeking innovative new ways to teach and learn.
