Q Fever Project

Assoc. Prof. Rowland Cobbold is locally coordinating research involving Q fever vaccination on the Gatton campus. The project aims to evaluate a new diagnostic test for Q fever, which would hopefully replace the problematic current testing protocol. It is also aims to collect immunological response data to guide the design of an improved Q fever vaccine in the future. This work is being funded by the US Defense Threat Reduction Agency, and is being conducted in collaboration with Harvard

University/Massachusetts General Hospital and Innatoss (Netherlands). Project work was conducted in parallel with the routine Q fever screening and vaccination program that is run each year at UQ Health Services on Gatton campus.

Sample collection for this year is almost completed, with 95 students enrolling as project participants. Although some hiccups occurred with snap COVID-19 lockdowns, data to date are already providing interesting results that are very useful to meeting project objectives. The project team would like to pass on their deepest thanks to all

student participants. Without their collegial agreement to assist, this research would not have been possible.

Semester 2, 2021 Learning Resources

The Library has commenced work to prepare course reading lists for Semester 2, 2021.

To ensure required and recommended Learning Resources are available to students in Week 1, we encourage you to start considering your learning resources, reading lists and textbooks for Semester 2.

Details of recommended and required learning resources must be confirmed no later than 8 weeks prior to the commencement of the course, in accordance with the University's Course Design Policy

This message includes information to assist you with preparing your Semester 2 learning resources:

- ECPS process for Semester 2 learning resources (required and recommended).
- · Procedure for adding further readings to your reading list.
- An option to update your reading lists throughout the semester.
- Advice for selecting electronic resources and considering Open Educational Resources (OER) to enhance student access to their learning materials.

Required and recommended resources

Details of required and recommended learning resources including textbooks, websites, learning guides and readings should be submitted via the Electronic Course Profile System (ECPS). Please review/update and confirm these items in Section 3 of the ECPS. Once confirmed, the required and recommended readings will automatically be sent to both the Library and School Locker. Only resources listed in section 3.1 and 3.2 of the ECP that have been confirmed will be passed to the Library and School Locker. For further information, see the Learning Resources ECPS guide.

Further learning resources

To notify the library of any other resources, please email learningresources@library.uq.edu.au, noting that additional resources will only be processed once the required and recommended readings for all courses have been processed.

You can update your reading lists throughout the semester

The Library will create your reading list based on the information submitted to the ECPS using our reading list system, Talis Aspire. Once published, reading lists are available in Learn.UQ (Blackboard) and via the Library. You can edit your own reading lists, allowing you to quickly and easily update your lists, structure to suit your course content and add notes to provide additional guidance to students.

Going digital

The Library has an e-preferred collection management policy. It acquires resources in electronic format, where possible. The Library supports the incorporation of electronic textbooks into teaching and learning, however commercially published electronic textbooks can be very expensive for libraries and often include restrictive access conditions or are only available for students to purchase. For electronic book purchases, the Library can be limited to 1 or 3 simultaneous users with other users locked out until a 'borrowed' copy is returned. It is becoming more common for publishers to remove the ability to download and save a copy of the book to refer to later, which has implications for open book exams. See eTextbooks for Courses for more information and speak to your librarian when selecting commercially published text to ensure the library can provide full access for students.

Open educational resources

Open Educational Resources (OER) are a subset of born-digital material, access to which is online, free of charge and in varying degrees, free of most copyright and licensing restrictions. Open Textbooks are a type of OER that are created to be a free or low cost alternative to a commercially published textbook. Open Textbooks are an equitable way to provide access for students to learning resources. The Library has recently launched an open textbook publishing service, Open Textbooks @ UQ to enable academics to develop their own free textbooks, tailored to a specific course. Caitlin Mack – Small Animal Internal Medicine Resident

Dr Caitlin Mack is best known for her role as an Internal Medicine Resident in the VMC. As an important part of this role, Caitlin tutors, supports and mentors the final year BVSc students as they rotate through the small animal medicine service.

A little about Caitlin

Caitlin graduated from Charles Sturt University in 2014. She started her career in mixed practice in rural Victoria before spending time working in the UK. It was during this time that Caitlin really developed a love for companion animal medicine and was encouraged to further her knowledge and skills via a small animal internship at the University of Queensland Small Animal Hospital. Caitlin's love for medicine continued to grow during her time at UQ and she also developed a passion for teaching. Caitlin was fortunate enough for this to lead into her current position as an Internal Medicine Resident at UQ VETS. The position allows Caitlin to start her journey in becoming a medicine specialist whilst training under the guise of some of the best medical specialists in the country. Her interests in medicine include infectious diseases, urinary tract disease, endocrinology and renal disease. She also really enjoys teaching.

What makes Caitlin a great teacher?

Caitlin is a great teacher because she is passionate about small animal medicine, clinical reasoning, patient care and client communication. She strives to help the students to become 'well-rounded' professionals and to create a positive, supportive, enthusiastic and fun learning/work environment. She tutors students both in small groups and on a one to one basis, as they learn from the cases presented to the service. In rounds she gently encourages students to reason through the clinical cases presented, highlighting key take home messages, rules of thumb and tips for how to navigate similar cases as a new graduate veterinarian.
