Visit from Dr Allan Bakers

It was a pleasure for UQ SVS to host Dr Allan Bakers for a visit in late February. Dr Baker was awarded the UQ Gatton Gold Medal in December 2007. As a veterinarian and dedicated teacher, Dr Baker made a significant contribution to the Australian and worldwide development of the veterinary profession for more than 40 years.

Dr Baker's teaching involvement with UQ Gatton began through lecturing appointments and casual academic positions, then, between 1963 and 1967, he was Head Lecturer in Animal Science, before serving as a Senior Lecturer between 1970 and 1983. He was a Queensland Agricultural College Councillor between 1978 and 1983, and, from 1985 until 1988, he was Director of UQ's Pastoral Veterinary Centre at Goondiwindi. He also instructed at the UQ Gatton Campus as a casual academic in the School of Veterinary Science between 2002 and 2004.

His research and development activities in the animal and veterinary industries both in Australia and throughout the world have provided inspiration for generations of animal scientists and veterinarians.

Rod Verrall was delighted to reconnect with Dr Baker as they had worked closely together during Dr Baker's later years at UQ. Dr Baker was integral to the large animal practical training team, in the transition period between the St Lucia and Gatton campuses. Rod and Gry Boe-Hansen took the opportunity to demonstrate current practical training techniques utilising the 'legendairy' Mrs O'Leary.

Dr Baker visited with his son Cameron and grandson Harry. Harry is currently studying at the UQ Gatton Campus.



Darcy De Jong shares her adventures in Central West Queensland

I recently spent some time in Central West Queensland as part of an outreach program to promote vaccination numbers and support the hospitals in rural and remote communities.

I work for UQ as a veterinary nurse in the small animal surgical team and was granted community service leave by

UQ to embark on this adventure. I am also a graduate paramedic, which is how I satisfied the criteria to fulfil this role.

This experience saw me travel to locations that I would not have previously considered. I travelled to Longreach, Winton - home of some cool dinosaur fossils & footprints, Boulia, Blackall, Tambo - birthplace of the Tambo teddy, Barcaldine - site of the tree of knowledge where the Labour Party was founded by shearers, and Alpha.

I met people from remote stations, business owners from small towns, families so big they seemed to contribute to most of the shire's population, football teams, and many retired farmers who had a story or two to which I gladly listened. The commonality amongst all people, was their desire to contribute to herd health and protect their community from COVID.

A highlight for me was riding a horse at dawn through the bush in Longreach, managing to stay in the saddle but sustaining bruises from hanging on with my legs as my previously sedentary horse's enthusiasm for its distant feed bucket could not be contained.

Every town had its own hidden gems, from swimming holes and aquatic centres, to historic museums, artwork, and a community run retro movie theatre! The communities were warm and welcoming, and never shy to stop and have a yarn when they found a new face. The currency in the Central West is baked goods, so I have returned with a few extra kilos as well as wonderful memories and new skills.

We had another stellar line of speakers this year starting with a motivational 'call to arms' from Courtney Stewart, 2021 recipient of the SVS Lyn Knott Teaching Foundations Award. Library metrics support for grant applications and promotion

UQ Library offers a range of online training and self-help for researchers requiring evidence for grant applications and promotion.

An online tutorial is available to help researchers navigate the various databases that provide evidence for academic/publication achievements for promotions or grant application. It contains links to videos on how to use some of the databases, such as Altmetric Explorer (for online attention to your work) and PatCite (to see whether your publications have been cited in patents).

Teacher showcase



Courtney Stewart – Production Animal Vet Nurse and Clinical Tutor Cert 4 VN, Dip ECC, Dip Appl Sci (Equine) RVN (VNCA)

Courtney is best known for her role as a veterinary nurse in the Production Animal Service, and for her tutoring over a range of subjects and in the Clinical Skills Hub. Courtney teaches into both the Bachelor of Veterinary Science and Veterinary Technology programs. Although the majority of her clinical work and tutoring focuses on livestock and

production animals, when in the HUB Courtney tutors across a range of clinical disciplines – basically helping students to practice and refine any skills they wish to focus on. Having worked as a veterinary nurse for around 17 years, Courtney is currently working towards a VTS (Veterinary Technology Specialist) in Production Animal Medicine. If successful she will be the first recipient of this qualification in the southern hemisphere (and one of only a handful worldwide!)

Courtney's teaching is very well received by the students. She received the 'Golden Dissection Kit Best Tutor' Award from the fourth-year veterinary students in 2021. She also received the 'Veterinary Tutor who has made the Most Valuable Contribution to Veterinary Technology Teaching in 2021' at the recent Veterinary Technology Graduation Dinner.

Buoyed by her mantra to 'change the world of veterinary nursing one production animal at a time', Courtney is an inspiring nurse and teacher. She aims to support the development of confident and competent graduates through her grassroots and down-to-earth approach. For Courtney, teaching is about creating a safe and welcoming environment for students to learn: 'there are no stupid questions, except for the one you didn't ask'. She is a clear, organised and articulate coach, able to break down complex and daunting tasks into simple and meaningful steps. Her work is admired by students and colleagues alike.
