Candidates must have a minimum of five years postgraduate experience to be recognised as a VTS-DI, and complete a rigorous application process demonstrating superior knowledge in scientifically and humanely based techniques of diagnostic imaging for all

veterinary patients. Currently, there are fewer than 20 technicians designated VTS-DI worldwide. This is a huge achievement and demonstration of commitment!!

Launch of new online course on Animal Welfare in China

The Animal Welfare Standards Project team, working out of the School of Veterinary Science under the direction of Professor Alan Tilbrook, has launched a brand-new online course for Chinese students.

The Animal Welfare In China course, hosted on the Edx Edge platform, will offer users the opportunity to access free learning materials providing animal welfare knowledge relevant to China. Made up of videos, podcasts, lectures and reading materials all in Mandarin, the course features seven modules, including companion animal welfare and laboratory animal welfare.

With introductions to each module presented by filmmaker and founder of the Good Food Fund, Jian Yi and presentations and content from academic and industry experts around the world, the course will outline what animal welfare is and why it is important and relevant within society and the agricultural industry.

Participants will also learn how to measure welfare and develop an understanding of scientific evidence and processes for determining animal welfare.
