Vaccine trial launched for dogs with bone cancer

SVS researchers are recruiting pet dogs diagnosed with cancer to test an experimental vaccine.

The clinical research trial is for dogs recently diagnosed with canine appendicular osteosarcoma, a common bone tumour that affects 10,000 dogs a year globally.

Pet owners able to take their dog to the UQ VETS Small Animal Hospital at Gatton for surgery and treatment will be preferentially selected, however the team would also like to recruit patients from elsewhere in Australia, except NSW (due to an ethics requirement).

The project team includes experienced veterinarians, board-certified pathologists and clinical trial experts who will provide regular monitoring and follow ups.

I was so excited that my project, which would potentially help dogs battle this devastating disease, would reach out to many in need. I was excited and went along with my supervisor Professor Allavena to learn first hand how media releases work.

We have been working with UQ Media and Communications to advertise this clinical trial. Just 5 minutes before the Channel 10 crew were to conduct the interview, a person from the Communication team informed me that I would need to be speak. It was jarring to be able to stand, let alone talk, in this total media environment. Before I could comprehend what was happening or prepare myself to speak, I was in front of the microphone ready to be interviewed by a journalist.

It's true that without new experiences something inside us sleeps. I spoke with the media while being filmed and I believe I did a decent job. I remember frequently looking towards Professor Allavena for support. Afterwards, everyone appreciated my talk and Professor Allavena's words "well done Abhi" echoed inside me. I was so relieved and took a relaxing breath. The UQ Communication team were a great help throughout. If other students need to engage with the public to support their research they should definitely consider reaching out to them for assistance.

First experiences are thrilling and surprising. My mind stretched with this experience and it gave me a new sense of confidence. I am grateful for this extremely valuable exposure.

Rachel Allavena visits Universitas Brawijaya in Indonesia

This July I had the great pleasure to attend Universitas Brawijaya in Malang East Java, Indonesia. Malang has a mild 'highland climate', and is surrounded by mountains including Mt Bromo, a famous scenic volcano which I was lucky to visit. It is a lovely city, with excellent food, and fantastic hospitality from my hosts including Dean Dr Dyah and Vice Dean Dr Fajar and the staff and students of UB

Faculty of Veterinary Medicine. I was hosted by our Master of Veterinary Sciences (pathology) graduate Dr Andreas Bandang, a pathologist at the veterinary school. My visit included teaching the FVMUB's international student study program, where I had the great pleasure of catching up with some students from Nong Lam University who I'd taught in March this year, as well as some very talented students from the Philippines. VSANZ review of veterinary science education capability of Australia and New Zealand

Veterinary Schools of Australia and New Zealand (VSANZ), has recently released the independent expert review of the veterinary science education capability of Australia and New Zealand. The review was conducted by a panel of three eminent veterinarians led by Dr Helen Scott-Orr AM PSM. The report from the review is entitled 'Rethinking veterinary education: Securing Australasia's future in biosecurity, food production, One Health and animal welfare'. It is freely available from the VSANZ website.

Everyone is encouraged to read the report – the panel received submissions from around Australia and also interviewed many stakeholders associated with the profession and the education sector.

The report finds that veterinary education is at a crisis point in Australasia, with inadequate funding to meet the costs of a very expensive teaching program with university operating models, and deteriorating wellbeing amongst students, staff and graduates. It makes 25 recommendations, addressed variously at veterinary schools themselves, their universities, accrediting bodies, veterinary professional associations, and governments. Among the key recommendations are:

- The establishment of a strategic change fund among the universities to unlock effective veterinary school resource-sharing models;
- Accelerated efforts to reduce the cost burden of school accreditation, and to move from assessing inputs to outcomes;
- An increase in government funding for veterinary students, and a clinical training loading for priority areas; and
- The exploration of veterinary apprenticeship and bonding models.

VSANZ and Veterinary Schools are now engaged with a variety of stakeholders to raise awareness about the report and to discuss and prioritise actions aligned with the recommendations.
