With the generous support from the Keith Mackie Lucas scholarship, Tolga Bat Hospital, WDA student travel scholarships, and our esteemed leader Prof Joanne Meers and Dr Lee's crazy Flybuys reward

scheming, we managed to have full attendance by all team members, each presenting their research in areas as diverse as bat virology, flying fox tick paralysis and cleft palate syndrome of the endangered spectacled flying fox. Testament to the amazing work that staff and students are performing, fourth year BVSc student Mr Zachary Low received both a student travel scholarship and runner up student presentation award for his phenotypic and genetic investigations into cleft palate syndrome; Ms Jennifer Sullivan was awarded a student travel scholarship to present her bat herpesvirus work; Ms Jessica Mitchell was awarded a WDA research award to further her research into flying fox retrovirus; and Dr Lee received the one off somewhat "mother hen" award for bringing along the entire research team. SVS PhD student Yifei Yang attends the ISAE Congress in Estonia

In August 2023, SVS PhD student Yifei Yang had the opportunity to present at the Annual Congress of the International Society for Applied Ethology (ISAE) in Tallinn, Estonia. Yifei is a final-year PhD student specialising in animal welfare science. Her PhD research focuses on the welfare of farmed freshwater fish during live transport in the Chinese context, which is an emerging topic in farm animal

welfare. Yifei's advisors are Dr Kris Descovich, Dr Edward Narayan, and Prof Qingjun Shao from Zhejiang University.

ISAE is an international society that provides a forum for the presentation and discussion of advances in applied animal behaviour science and education and inspires further innovation through an annual international scientific congress and regional meetings. Yifei successfully received a Developing Countries Congress Attendance Fellowship (DCCAF) to cover her attendance at the 56th Congress of ISAE in Tallinn, Estonia, from 31 July to 5 August 2023. The DCCAF program aims to support researchers in the field of farm animal welfare and behaviour from developing countries who wish to attend the congress. This is a highly competitive fellowship, and Yifei was selected as one of only 14 DCCAF awardees. This fellowship supported Yifei to attend a pre-congress DCCAF workshop that connected awardees with senior scientists from across the world, various congress events, and post-congress farm visits in Tallinn. Yifei also delivered her first ISAE oral presentation titled "Effect of simulated road transport on the behaviour and welfare of largemouth bass (*Micropterus salmoides*)" on 3 August 2023.

Overall, Yifei had an incredible opportunity to meet senior researchers in animal behaviour and welfare, share her experiences from China, present her research findings at the ISAE Congress and expand her professional network with the support of DCCAF.
