Chantelle Jukic wins ACVS awards

Our resident and DVClinSc student Chantell Jukic was the winner of the ACVS Outstanding Surgery Residents' Award and winner of the ACVS/ECVS Resident Speaker

Exchange Program Award.

The Outstanding Surgery Resident's Award competition encourages the development of clinically important research and the dissemination of the results of these investigations. A winner from the best ACVS resident small and large animal presentations will be invited to present at the European College of Veterinary Surgeons meeting.



Chantelle won this award for her presentation, "Mechanical testing of two constructs for distal inter phalangeal joint arthrodesis (Chantelle Jukic, Andrew van Eps, Alex Young, Steven Zedler). Successful coffin joint arthrodesis has been a near impossible challenge for equine surgeons to date. There are only a handful of successful case reports and the procedure is difficult and fraught with complications. The new method we developed has already been used successfully in 2 cases, and numerous world renowned practices including University of Pennsylvania, Mid Atlantic Equine Hospital, and Grosbois Equine Clinic intend to use this technique.

Congratulations to MPhil student Anthony Feez

SVS MPhil student Anthony Feez won the Meat & Livestock Australia – Innovation for the red meat industry \$1500 award at the 7th Animal Science Poster Olympics in November 2023. Anthony presented his work on "Validation of an objective method to count buffalo fly under field conditions". Anthony is supervised by Dr Swaid Abdullah, Associate Professor Ben Wood, and Professor Nigel Perkins.



German neurology specialist Prof Thomas Flegel visits SVS

In October we were lucky to host German neurology specialist Professor Thomas Flegel for a 2 week visit at Gatton, following his keynote neurology lecture series in Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane. Thomas leads an 8 veterinarian small animal neurology service at the University of Leipzig.



Thomas spent an evening as the guest speaker for the small animal medicine (SAM) SIG group where he spoke about his amazing career path and then gave tips on the neurologic exam. He kept the students engrossed for over 3 hours and inspired them to pursue their dreams despite great difficulties (such as the Berlin wall and years of applying for residencies).

Thomas gave several impromptu lectures to large animal internal medicine, sports medicine and surgery residents and 5th year clinical students. He also provided assistance on clinical cases in the small and large animal clinics, including several dogs from the emergency clinic. He even performed a series of neurologic exams as part of an investigation on a herd of neurologic goats from outback Queensland! Thanks to Aaron Herndon for hosting Thomas in the small animal clinic and to Rachel Allavena for accommodating him in pathology.

Allison Stewart and Thomas both completed their residencies from 1999-2021 at The Ohio State University. Allison teaches 3rd year general neurology and 4th year equine neurology, and Aaron teaches 4th year small animal neurology, so there was an opportunity to benchmark preclinical and clinical teaching and exchange teaching resources. Thomas enjoyed his visit and was fascinated to hear about the neurologic

conditions caused by Australian venomous species of snakes, spiders, ticks, jellyfish and octopuses and departed Gatton feeling just a little nervous on his trip north to Cairns!

APCOVE launches field training package

The Asia Pacific Consortium of Veterinary
Epidemiology (APCOVE) has launched its world-class field
training package on the sidelines of the World Health
Summit in Berlin. The package is designed to help veterinary
practitioners and para veterinarians detect and prevent
infectious diseases outbreaks. The package comprises 36
eLearning modules on outbreak investigation, surveillance, risk
assessment, One Health, biosecurity, leadership and
communication - this is now the most comprehensive training



package on field veterinary epidemiology globally that is available online and free of cost for anyone to access from anywhere in the world.

The modules have been prepared by the collective efforts of more than 40 APCOVE partners from all veterinary schools in Australia and New Zealand, one veterinary school from the US and eight countries in the Asia-Pacific region over the past three years. Professor Joerg Henning has been leading the development of these eLearning modules for the University of Queensland. APCOVE was established in 2020 to strengthen the veterinary epidemiology capacity in the Asia-Pacific region with funding provided through the Indo-Pacific Centre of Health Security.

The eLearning modules have been developed and tested in Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines, Timor-Leste and Vietnam. The modules have also been translated into five languages and are available in Lao, Khmer, Bahasa Indonesia, Vietnamese and Burmese.

"Don't pay APCs! Learn how the UQ Library 2024 Read and Publish Agreements can help".

Read and Publish agreements progress the transition to open access publishing. UQ authors can publish their research in included open access titles without paying APCs. The Library funds open publishing via a combined access and publishing cost. This webinar will discuss the UQ Read and Publish agreements, and demonstrate a collection of tools that UQ Library have developed to assist in the open access publishing process. The workshop will:

- Explain Read and Publish agreements
- · How to select journals based on impact factor, quartile and subject area
- Coverage of an APC by a Read and Publish agreement
